Focus Artist

Eric Joyner

A painter and illustrator whose playful, colourful, and often bizarre work radiates a sense of fun and nostalgia drawn from vintage Pop Culture, Eric Joyner is best known for his series 'Robots and Doughnuts', inspired by a scene in a film.



He decided to paint only things that he liked, and took inspiration from his collection of old tin robots and spaceships to create his most famous images, adding the doughnut element after watching a film. His work has a nostalgic vibe, and is sometimes called 'Pop Surrealism' because of its fantastical nature.





Vocabulary A style of art that was heavily inspired by Pop the popular culture of the 1960s and 1970s in America. Commonly referred to Surrealism as a 'retro/nostalgic' style, this movement was most commonly seen in the form of paintings, digital art, sculpture, collage, and even toys. Creating the illusion of three-dimensional Depth space on a two-dimensional surface. One of the three colours: red. vellow. **Primary** and blue, that can be mixed together in colours different ways to make any other colour. One of the three colours: orange, green, Secondary or purple, that can be made colours by mixing together two of the primary colours. The part of a picture, scene, or design **Background** that forms a setting for the main figures or objects, or appears furthest from the viewer. The part of a view that is nearest to the **Foreground** observer, especially in a picture or photograph. Representing three-dimensional objects Perspective on a two-dimensional surface so as to give the right impression of their height, width, depth, and position in relation to each other. A colour, especially with regard to how Shade light or dark it is. A form or degree of colour. Tone A small amount of colour. Tint A tertiary colour is made by mixing equal Tertiary amounts of a primary colour and a colour secondary colour together. Pairs of colours that are on opposite Complemen sides of the colour wheel. that contrast tary colour with each other more than any other colour, and when placed side-by-side make each other look brighter.
