Different Types of Puppets

Marionette puppets

are controlled by strings.



Sock puppets are moved by someone's hand.



A **hand puppet** is

controlled by someone's hand.

Finger puppets move by using our fingers!



Vocabulary	
puppet	A <u>movable</u> model of a person or animal that is typically moved either by strings controlled from above or by a hand inside it.
features	How something looks and is made.
fabric	Cloth such as cotton, silk and wool.
template	Shape or pattern to use as a guide.
running	A small even stitch run in and out of cloth.
over stitch	A stitch used to close edges together.
fasten on/off	To begin or end sewing securely so that your stitches do not come undone.
decoration	Anything used to make something more attractive—button, sequin, ribbon etc.
seam	The sewing line where two pieces of fabric are joined— not too close to the edge!
