Artist

Dr Alaa Awad

Dr Alaa Awad is an Egyptian painter and muralist. He was born in 1981 and became



famous for his special murals in Cairo in 2012.

His paintings, drawings, mosaic and murals capture the history and traditions of Egypt, which he translated into a colourful Neo-Phaoronic (modern Egyptian) style.



Many of these same images can be seen in Awad's artwork today as he is inspired by the famous works of art from Ancient Egypt that may be seen in temples and museums. He currently works as a lecturer and PhD candidate at South Valley University (SVU), Faculty of Fine Arts in Egypt.

Vocabulary	
Mosaic	a picture or pattern produced by arranging small pieces of stone, tile, glass, etc. together
Collage	a piece of art made by sticking various different materials such as photographs and pieces of paper or fabric on to a backing
Texture (Actual) (Implied)	the feel, appearance, or consistency of a surface or substance you can touch and feel the texture it represents texture
Mural	a large picture that has been painted on the wall of a room or building
Overlap	to cover part of the same space or part of something else
